Political Career

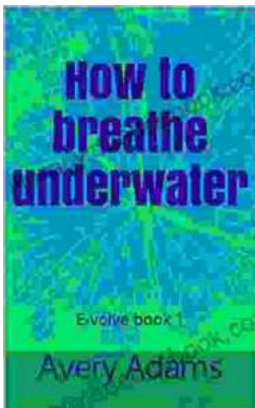
